Student Conduct

Since June 19, 2019 we have received 9 complaints containing reports of disruptive behavior. This includes Summer and Fall 2019 through September 23, 2019.

- 6 reports from single-family homes
- 1 report from 3333 Wisconsin Ave. Apts.
- 2 reports from the Avalon Apts.

Same period last year (June 19, 2018 through Sept. 23, 2018) totaled 8 reports.


