

There's no better place than Washington, DC, to develop as a global leader. **Situated at the crossroads of policy and politics, DC is a global hub for decision-making and thought leadership.** Our proximity to and relationships with bilateral and multilateral organizations, embassies, federal agencies, and countless think tanks, businesses, and nonprofit organizations offer unparalleled opportunities. Every day as an SIS student, you will encounter opportunities to do internships, learn from high-impact organizations, or engage directly with high-profile diplomats, policymakers, thought leaders, and practitioners. You will learn how to navigate Washington, DC, as one component of navigating the world.

Our 120+ full-time faculty use a multidisciplinary and intersectional approach, and they include political scientists, economists, sociologists, anthropologists, demographers, geographers, historians, and experts in international development, global health, communications, energy, and the environment among their ranks.

You'll examine international affairs through multiple lenses and define your own unique degree trajectory—whether in government, nonprofits, or the private sector—with expert guidance.

The DM program offers a unique combination of applied skills found in a traditional MS degree—such as project management, economics, and quantitative research methods—with an ethics-driven, multidisciplinary, and theoretically rigorous approach to the field of development. MA in Global Governance, Politics, and Security: Quantitative Economic Methods

The Global Governance, Politics, and Security: Quantitative Economic Methods (STEM) degree provides a focused education in quantitative methods and applied economics essential for students of global security, multilateral diplomacy, political economy, and economic development. Our graduates are well-positioned to shape policy with data-driven, effective solutions at jobs in government affairs, multilateral organizations, and international business. The International Peace and Conflict Resolution program prepares graduates to be peacebuilders in a wide variety of professional settings and political contexts. The program is committed to contributing to sustainable peace by addressing root causes and overt manifestations of violent conflict.

MS in International Relations and Business (Online)

MA in International Relations (Online)

International Relations Online offers you a foundation in international relations and specialized expertise through concentrations in global security, international development, international negotiation and conflict resolution, and US foreign policy and national security. Classes are delivered on an engaging learning platform—wherever you are located around the globe—and combine self-paced content with live virtual class sessions.

Master of International Service

The executive track is the accelerated international affairs degree for experienced professionals with at least seven years of work experience. The program prepares students to analyze foreign politics, culture, and society and emphasizes decision-making, leading multicultural workforces, and change management. Students can align their coursework with their desired career trajectory by selecting from a variety of concentrations or create their own. PhD in International Relations


The PhD program trains you to produce new knowledge of the highest scholarly caliber. The program prepares you for a career as a scholar-teacher at universities and research institutes in both the private and public sectors. The core curriculum covers the foundational fields of international studies: international relations, comparative politics, and social theory. You will pick one of eight concentrations and also take a three-course, multiple-methodology sequence that introduces you to the major qualitative and quantitative research techniques used in the social sciences today. You will affiliate with one of our departments for in-depth work on an area of concentration. SIS provides you with generous financial support, which includes tuition remission and a research stipend, both of which can be renewed for up to four years. **7** www.american.edu/sis/phd

Dual Degrees

A challenging curriculum that encourages critical thinking is the foundation for doing global differently.

Our master's curriculum is focused on preparing you for a career in global service and enhancing your current career path. Each master's degree is grounded in a set of core courses alongside economics and research methods. You also will select a specialized concentration to focus your program on your unique interest in a particular aspect of international affairs. The final component of the program is a capstone project, which can include an applied practicum, a substantial research paper, or a master's thesis.



Building your degree, from core to capstone

Our doctoral program curriculum provides training in international relations that is both multidisciplinary and policy-relevant. This scholarly program enables our graduates to go on to careers in university teaching and research, government, and non-governmental organizations in the United States as well as around the globe.

Doing global differently means access to a graduate education without boundaries or borders.

It's no secret that our experiences help shape us. Experiential learning at SIS also will enhance your progress over the course of your graduate studies. Professional internships, study abroad opportunities, and applied practicum projects abound in Washington, DC, and around the world.

In recent years, students have interned at organizations such as the World Wildlife Fund, Save the Children, the US Department of State, the Embassy of France, the Stimson Center, Open Society Foundations, the United Nations Relief and Works Agency, the Wilson Center, Amnesty International, and the Stern Group.

Skills Institutes

Skills institutes are intensive workshops designed to introduce you to professional skills relevant to careers in international affairs. Taught by experienced practitioners from many fields, the courses allow participants to translate theory into practice and gain relevant skills and experiences sought by today's employers.

Approximately 15 weekend skills institutes are offered each semester to help you gain practical tools necessary for effective global leadership. These workshops take place over two to three days during one or two weekends, typically a Friday evening, Saturday, and Sunday.

Skills Institute In-Depth: Briefing Policymakers

Taught by Craig Schmall, senior analyst for the CIA, this course provides students with the tools to construct and deliver a memorable and impactful briefing for policymakers. Students gain the skills and confidence to handle a briefing at any level in the policy world through a combination of presentations and group discussion, real-life examples of policy briefings, and challenging practical exercises. The course is a great place for students to reveal and understand their strengths and weaknesses with verbal presentations while also analyzing the policymaker's level of knowledge, biases, and needs.

Practicum Program

As an SIS student, you will have the chance to apply to participate in a practicum course as your masters' capstone. The practicum is a one-semester, 3-credit team-based course in which you serve as a consultant for agencies and organizations, gaining real-world experience. Other capstone options include writing a substantial research project or thesis.

The client presents a challenge, and your student team works together to produce deliverables that meet the client's needs, with the professor acting as a coach and facilitator. Some practicum courses (typically summer courses) include domestic or international travel.

Conflict and Climate Migration

Issues surrounding global human migration are among the wickedest of wicked problems. As such, they require integrating methods and perspectives from many disciplines to address questions of human rights, resource access and sustainability, climate change impacts, peacebuilding and security, and more. Taking an interdisciplinary approach, this practicum will engage in research and the proposed recommendations for the International Organization for Migration (IOM) on topics and geographies of their choosing. In previous years, the practicum has focused our work for IOM on Chad, Nigeria, and Costa Rica; our diverse foci have included circular (labor) migration, food insecurity and changing migration patterns, vulnerability to trafficking, potential means and methods of community stabilization, and increasing the agency of migrants.
